Short Overview

At the first moment we got involved in training countryside and urban women from BPW Ijuí to work with stingless bees in order to have an extra income in their lives. We held five workshops.

Workshop I:

A visit to the beekeepers in Ijuí City and also in the countryside.



Workshop II:

We had introduction and basic class administered by EMATER Agronomists.





Workshop III:

We visited *Escola Modelo* – a school in Ijuí - that has been creating a stingless bees nursery in order to spread the specimen and develop in the students the environmental awareness.



Workshop IV:

Classes administered by SENAR on the farm to the employees' wives in order to offer them an additional occupation and bring an extra income to their homes.





Workshop V:

To achieve ONU goals we are going to visited an Indigenous Territory next week, and included them in the project so that the indigenous women may have another income and also work with the bees, whereas they, before Christ, had been the ones who had already handled with the bees as a mean of livelihood. In addition, they contributed by giving the name of the tribe to the specimen of the stingless bees, that is, *Meliponineos*.

Financial

Also the project is supported by public and private organizations that could provide economic and material support, such as: EMATER (Association of technical Assistance and Rural Extension Projects of Rio Grande do Sul State), FARSUL (Agriculture Federation of Rio Grande do Sul State), SENAR (National Rural Learning Service of Ijuí-RS), Beekeepers Association of Ijuí-RS, Rural Labor Union of Ijuí and CRE (Regional Education Coordination of State of Rio Grande do Sul). The Rural Labor Union contributed with R\$ 2.700,00 to by 50 boxes for the swarm of bees.
